Indiana Farm Bureau Excellence in Agriculture Application For use in the 2024 Indiana Farm Bureau Contest ONLY

Background

The Indiana Farm Bureau Excellence in Agriculture Award was developed using the American Farm Bureau (AFBF) award application. The winner of the Indiana state contest will represent the state at the AFBF convention, held annually in January.

The Excellence in Agriculture Award competition is designed as an opportunity for young farmers and ag professionals to earn recognition, while actively contributing and growing though their involvement in Farm Bureau and agriculture. Participants will be judged on their involvement in agriculture, leadership ability, and participation/involvement in Farm Bureau and other organizations (i.e., civic, service and community). The ideal candidate(s) for the Excellence in Agriculture Award is an individual or couple who does not have the majority of their gross income subject to normal production risk.

Please note that the Indiana Farm Bureau Excellence in Agriculture Award application varies from the AFBF application. The state winner will be required to complete the AFBF application prior to the submission deadline in early December. ALL INFORMATION IS HANDLED IN STRICT CONFIDENCE AND IS DESTROYED AFTER JUDGING IS COMPLETED.

Eligibility:

- An applicant can be either an individual or a couple that is married or has similar legal rights under the law applicable to the state Farm Bureau organization. Applicant may choose to apply individually, rather than as a couple.
- Applicant(s) shall be a Farm Bureau member(s) between the ages of 18 and 35 in good standing with their county Farm Bureau. The individual or spouse/spousal-equivalent shall have reached their 18th birthday at the time they qualify for the national competition and shall not have reached their 36th birthday by the completion of the competition. Competitors qualify at the time the national application is submitted and the completion of the competition is the day awards are given out (exact date TBD January 2025).
- Applicant(s) must be in attendance on-site at the Indiana State YF&AP awards judging day (exact date TBD, typically in late June/early July).
- Applicant(s) must not have derived a majority of their gross income from an owned production agriculture enterprise in any of the past three years. Applicant(s) may only win one YF&AP award area per year (Rising Star, Excellence in Agriculture, Achievement Award, Discussion Meet).
- Current members of the Indiana YF&AP State Committee are not eligible to compete. Past members of the committee may compete.
- Past and present members of the AFBF Young Farmers & Ranchers Committee and/or their spouse are not eligible to compete.
- Previous state winners of the Indiana YF&AP Achievement Award ate not eligible to compete. Previous runners-up are eligible to compete again.
- Current employees or agents of county, state and/or the American Farm Bureau organizations and their affiliates are not eligible to compete. An affiliate is defined as an entity owned or controlled in whole or in part by another entity through, for example, ownership (including

partial ownership) or positions on the board of directors. Past employees and interns who were responsible for implementing any of the YF&R Competitive Events at the state or national level since January 1, 2019, are ineligible.

Contest Structure

• All applicants will complete the written application (must submit it via the online portal). The finalists (top 3) will be required to deliver an oral presentation.

Entry Form & Application Guidelines

- Do not use applicant's name, the name of their state or county, or any names that may bring about the recognition or identification of the applicant's county beyond the entry form. The written versions of the application have a search feature to locate any identifiers. Verbal and presentation reference to applicant's name, state and county will be allowed during your presentation for personalization of presentation.
- The entry form and application must be completed in first person narrative (i.e. I, me, we, etc.) for questions 1-5. "A1"/"A2" may not be used for questions 1-5. Applicants must use "A1"/"A2" to denote each applicant for all of question 6.
- Do not use abbreviations or acronyms unless it has been spelled out once with the abbreviation in parentheses behind it. For example, United States Department of Education (USDE). AFBF, FB, and YF&AP, INFB are acceptable to use throughout the application.
- No emailed or mailed entry forms will be accepted. This document is meant to be a reference only. All applications must be submitted via the online portal.
- It will be up to the judges' discretion to deduct points if applicants include activities before they were 18.

Presentation Guidelines

- The presentation will be an interactive, 25-minute presentation in which the applicant(s) has an opportunity to share the contents of their entire application in narrative form with a panel of three judges and the audience.
- Applicant(s) will have 25 minutes to present on the topics addressed in the application and address questions from the judges. Applicants will be notified by the timekeeper when 10 minutes are remaining and again when five minutes are remaining. Each judge will be prepared to ask one question. At 25 minutes, time will be called and the applicant's time in front of the judges will conclude even if judges have not been able to ask their questions. It will be up to the applicant(s) to determine how to use this time. If the answers to the judges' questions are complete before time is called, the room moderator will call time.
- The only visual means in which to deliver the information is through a PowerPoint or Prezi presentation. The applicant(s) needs to submit their presentation on a USB flash drive during the Excellence in Agriculture Competitor Orientation. Once the presentation has been downloaded onto the laptop, it cannot be changed. A computer, LCD projector, screen and one slide advancer remote will be provided. All presentations must be formatted to work on a PC. Contestants will not be allowed to use their own computer.
- Verbal and presentation references to applicant(s) name, state and county will be allowed during the presentation.

No props (including notes), sound or video of any kind will be allowed during the presentation.

Application Judging

- All applications will be judged by judges selected by INFB staff. These are the only judges that will be reviewing and scoring the applications.
- All judges will use the application rubric to score the applications.
- The following breakdown of points will be used for the application:

Presentation Judging

- The judges of the applications will identify three state finalists to move to the presentation round. To the best of our ability, INFB will use the same judges for both the presentation and the application round.
- All judges will use the same presentation rubric to score the presentations.
- The following breakdown of points will be used for the presentation:
